

God's Will

I delight to do thy will, O my God: yea, Thy law is within my heart—Psalm 40:8

What brings you delight: the visit from a friend, a job well done, the first bird in the spring, the laughter of a child, or even a good book? David found delight in doing the will of God. And David knew well what the will of God was because he had learned God's word. *"Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against Thee."* —Psalm 119:11.

When Jesus came into the world, he spoke of His purpose in coming in a singular topic—to do the will of the Father. This was the only way to accomplish our salvation. Jesus gave us the perfect example of doing the will of God even when it is painful to do so. When He prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane He asked the Father if there was any other way other than the torture and anguish, and separation from the Father He was about to go through. He finished His request with, *"not my will but Thy will be done."*

Jesus showed that doing the will of God at any cost brought blessings and everlasting glory. Andrew Murray (1828-1917) wrote, *"It was this disposition, His obedience that made Him worthy and fit to sit with God on the throne in heaven."*

We are admonished to whole-heartedly do God's will, no matter how difficult that may be. *"Not with eyeservice, as menpleasers; but as the servants of Christ, doing the will of God from the heart;"* —Ephesians 6:6.

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
